Grow Up Reading™ Tips for August: Playing

- Playing with your child is one way to help them develop social skills and self-control. As they interact with parents and others, they learn how people behave in social settings. Children also learn what's acceptable by taking their cues from you.
- Play is good for mom and dad's health too and you receive benefits from playing with your child too! It's important to play with your child for your child's sake. But, as an added bonus, you receive benefits from playing with your child too. The hormone oxytocin, which plays a role in parent-infant bonding, is released whenever mothers and fathers engage in affectionate play with their children of any age.
- Play and learning go hand-in-hand and they are not separate activities. They are intertwined. Think about them as a science lecture with a lab. Play is the child's lab.

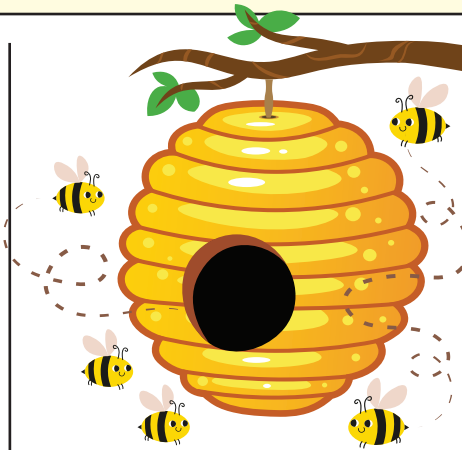
