Grow Up Reading[™] Tips for December: Counting and Plaving

- Introduce counting to your child from birth. One way is to start by asking your child "how old are vou?" with you holding up the correct number of fingers. If your child is not ready to model this behavior, continue to occasionally show them. Eventually they will.
- You can help your child learn to count by making counting a fun part of your day. Count socks as you sort them: count the juice boxes in your refrigerator; count the cars and buses going by. The more experience children have with counting, the more they will learn the meaning of numbers.
- Children are playful by nature. Their earliest experiences exploring with their senses lead them to play, first by themselves and eventually with others. The National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) has included play as a criterion in its accreditation process for programs for young children. "They call it their work," says Peter Pizzolongo, associate director for professional development at NAEYC. "When they're learning and plaving with joy, then it's a positive experience. They develop a positive approach to learning."
