- Your child wants to hear your voice more than any other. Singing and talking with your infant will help build your bond and bring comfort to your little one.
- Songs are a great way to help anyone learn and remember. An important part of early childhood development, singing contributes to teach behavior, basic skills, and social skills. Preschool songs also use rhymes to help children to learn vocabulary and communication skills.
- Studies have shown that children who sing and rhyme regularly also tend to have an easier time learning to speak. They have already developed the vocabulary to express themselves, and they also become more creative and confident. School is also easier for them, especially reading and spelling.




